Before you call someone, check their availability status. You will be able to see if they are already on another call or unavailable.



Make sure your lighting is appropriate. Sitting in front of a window with the curtains open creates glare and makes you difficult to see.



Mute yourself if there is background noise where you are.




Use your VC app's Status Message if you're going to be unavailable for a longer period of time. There is a handy feature that lets you set your Status Message to expire at a set time.



Be mindful of your background whilst on a video call, or blur your background if the app allows you to.



Dress appropriately for your audience on video calls.



Give everyone a chance to be heard. Remember not to talk over each other, especially if there are several of you on the call.
